UnitingCare West has a long history of providing out of home care for children and young people.

Our foster care services focus on providing long term placements for children and young people with often significant trauma and abuse histories, developmental, physical and/or medical care needs.

It is based on the belief that the needs of all children, including those with a disability are generally best met in a family environment.

Recruitment, assessment and training of new carers are key tasks of the service and are undertaken in line with the Department of Child Protection and Family Support (DCPFS) General Foster Care Assessment manual.



#### **Therapeutic Garden** The service aims to support the

A Therapeutic Garden is an outdoor garden space that has been specifically designed to meet the physical, psychological, social and spiritual needs of the people using the garden as well as their caregivers, family members and friends. The primary focus of the garden is to incorporate plants, friendly wildlife and other accessories into the space.

The setting is designed to include activity based things such as horticultural therapy or programs for passive uses such as quiet private sitting areas next to a small pond with a trickling waterfall.

UnitingCare West's therapeutic garden has been developed in consultation with master gardener, Sabrina Hahn, who has donated her time pro bono. A wonderful experienced childhood trauma and outoutcome for UnitingCare West.

#### From our CEO

December 2016... the last month of our calendar year. We have had some important conversations at UnitingCare West recently. I thought I would share three of them with you.

We were talking about how our services have been making a difference in the lives of people we work with. There was the story of a young person who had struggled to stay engaged with her schooling, but her end of year school report had many of us in tears... she had done so well; and a person who had so many troubles that they had been homeless for more than two years, but this year they will spend Christmas in their own little home; and the Christmas Party where all the residents in the adult accommodation service took up the invitation to organise a celebration for their families.

The staff supported all the

preparations but the excitement about the party was palpable. And these are only three stories...

You will read more about what has been going on a UnitingCare West in other parts of this newsletter.

A second conversation relates to resourcing an increasing demand for services. The changing economic circumstance is leading to an increased need in our community.

Emerging groups of people are vulnerable to homeless and the need for food and financial support to stay housed is increasing. And all of this is happening as Governments are changing their spending priorities and in a number of cases, have less funds available to spend.

Do more for less is the mantra... but this only works for a time, and then there will need to big changes in the community service system.

And finally, a conversation that is more personal. This will be my last Christmas at UnitingCare West. After nearly six years with the organisation, my season is coming to an end. The next CEO is

#### Level Up's Big Bike Swap at Tranby

"Bike Swap" provides repaired preloved bikes to people experiencing homelessness at UCW's Tranby Centre.

The initiative was launched in January by UCW's Level Up program where jobseekers, who are undertaking a training program to develop their employment and professional skills, are repairing old bikes so that they look like new again.

The jobseekers who are participating in the Level Up bike rescue program are supported by Atwork Australia. Together they refurbish old and worn down bicycles. The jobseekers collect bikes from donors or source them from verge collections. The state of each bike gets assessed and the jobseekers make a plan for each bike to clean them up and make them roadworthy.



Level Up participants put together a manual to go with each bike that includes practical tips for bike maintenance and safety. People experiencing homelessness can then register for a refurbished bike at UCW's Tranby Centre. Alternatively, they can bring their old bike and swap it for a bike that was refurbished by Level Up. We encourage people to cycle safely and therefore each client receives a driver's safety kit which includes a helmet, lock and drink bottle.

All the bikes are inspected and taken to a professional bike repairer for a safety inspection and a test before being handed out to clients.

# Plastic recycling program at Food Rescue

Recycling plastics so that they can be turned into plastic bins and chairs has become part of the daily business at UCW's Food Rescue.

The service is separating an estimated 4 cubic metres of plastic at the moment, including supermarket packaging for fruit and vegetables that we rescue. Instead of depositing plastics at landfill, this new system helps the environment by recycling plastics.

Each week, Food Rescue recycles 4 different types of plastics that are picked up by a company called CLAW Environmental.CLAW melts the plastic down into a form that can be used in the remanufacturing process to make various products.

CLAW also collects the foam boxes that some foods are transported in. They are compressed and once in China they are turned into coat hangers and floor boards.
