We've Turned on the Lights at Tranby Help us to keep them on!

It's Saturday morning in Northbridge and after a night of soaking rain, a chill hangs heavy in the air. Around 80 men and women are gathered at the Tranby Centre, enjoying breakfast, hot showers and the chance to chat over a cuppa.

Allan's been visiting Tranby for years, but these days he's there to lend support, having found a place of his own. Most of his friends aren't so lucky and until recently, haven't had anywhere to go on Saturday mornings to enjoy the very simplest of needs.

"When you're homeless, even a hot shower can be enough

to brighten up your day," Allan explains.

Thanks to the generous support of the Perth community during the 2017 Winter Appeal: Turn on the Lights, Tranby is now open for a few hours every Saturday morning. But more help is needed to keep the doors open and provide additional support for those in need into summer and beyond.

UCW CEO Amanda Hunt said the Winter Appeal was an opportunity to shine a light on the plight of people doing it tough and start a conversation about how all of us can help to end homelessness.

Award for Wilf Sargent House

Men who were experiencing homelessness have the chance to rebuild their lives with the support of UnitingCare West at historic Wilf Sargent House, redesigned by renowned Fremantle Architect Michael Patroni of Spaceagency.

The renovations have successfully combined the building's original features with contemporary practicality and Spaceagency has won the Heritage Margaret Pitt Morison Award as a result.

Refurbishment of the historic property was achieved through collaboration between the Housing Authority of WA and local government. Both identified the need for this type of service in the heart of the Fremantle community as well as preservation of local history and architecture. The Department for Child Protection and accomodation.

Family Services provides the funding for program support.

The history of the property on South Terrace can be traced back to 1895. It was first established as a refuge for homeless men and couples during the 1980 by the Uniting House Welfare office that provided programs such as foster care, low cost grocery access and general welfare assistance.

In establishing this service, the group named the property Wilf Sargent House after a long-time member of the Fremantle Wesley Mission congregation and Treasurer of the Mission.

Wilf Sargent House is committed to providing professional service aimed at building on the skills and knowledge of clients to assist them to access and maintain secure
